her degree is in both theology and philosophy. She is the co-founder and acting director of the Siena Symposium for Women, Family, and Culture, an interdisciplinary think tank, organized to respond to Pope St. John Paul II's call for a new and explicitly Christian feminism.

She is currently working on a book entitled *Woman and Man*.
