

## Freshman Retention

Retention is the percentage of full-time, first-time bachelor's (or equivalent) degree-seeking undergraduates from the previous fall who are again enrolled in the next fall.

## Graduation Rates

Graduation rates are the percentage of students completing their program within a specified time period of the normal period of time (4 years), up to a time period of one and a half times (150%) the normal period of time (i.e., 6 years). These rates are for full-time, first-time degree-seeking undergraduate students, accounting for the number of students entering the institution as full-time, first-time degree-seeking students in a particular year (cohort), and the number of students who transferred to other institutions.
